


# What is Usenet?

- A distributed system of discussion groups ("newsgroups")
- Covers thousands of topics
- Text-based, with messages in a similar format to e-mail
- Sometimes called "netnews" or simply "news"
- Also used as a file sharing platform


- No central server
- Network consists of many news servers




- Server admins arrange to forward posts to each other
- This is called a peering agreement
- Admins decide which groups to carry




- Users connect to a news server to read and post messages
- Messages propagate through the network to other servers




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
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



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



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

















- Identity all client-side.
- Upside: Can post from anywhere, and move providers easily
- Downside: Forgery is possible (like with email)

# **Usenet Protocols**

- NNTP (Network News Transfer Protocol)
- Formerly, batch copying using UUCP
- ... or sometimes even an airmailed magtape!


# **Usenet Moderation**

- Most groups are unmoderated
- Moderated groups require approval for all posts
- Posts go to a moderator by email; the moderator must then send them to a news server
- Huge reduction in spam and abuse
- But needs responsive moderators, or preferably a team

# How does Usenet compare to other social media?

**Centralized Social Media:** 

- Top-down control
- Proprietary platforms




- Acts as "town square" but actually privately owned
- Platform lock-in: people want to be where other people are
- Owner can change your user experience
- If server shuts down, your account and posts are gone

# How does Usenet compare to other social media?

#### **Usenet:**

- Federated network of servers
- Open protocols (NNTP)
- Free software (e.g. Thunderbird, INN)
- Anyone can run a server



- You can talk to anyone from any other server (as long as other admins will peer with your server)
- User experience is under your control use any client you like, or write one
- If one server shuts down, use another. Your old posts will exist anywhere with a long enough retention.

# How does Usenet compare to other social media?

The Fediverse:

- Federated network of servers
- Open protocols
- Free software
- Anyone can run a server



- You can talk to anyone from any other server (unless they defederate you)
- User experience is under your control use any client you like, or write one
- If one server shuts down, join another
- Most existing Fediverse servers are oriented towards personal (micro)blogging and media sharing

## How does Usenet compare to the Fediverse?

- On Usenet you follow groups, not people
- Usenet uses email for direct messaging
- Usenet is good for long-form multi-party discussions

# What are Usenet's strengths?

- Highly resistant to censorship
- High degree of anonymity is possible
- Forms lively communities around common interests
- Well-established social conventions promoting smooth and respectful communication
- Largely compatible with tools that process e-mail

## What are Usenet's weaknesses?

- No reliable way to edit or delete a post
- Poor support for multimedia
- Moderators can disappear
- Hard for new users to find it
- Hard to search

# **Abuse on Usenet**

- Spam and flooding
- Forgery
- Rogue cancels
- Organized disruption

# **Dealing with abuse**

User level:


- Killfiles to hide unwanted posts
- PGP signing as an anti-forgery measure

# **Dealing with abuse**


Admin level:

- Spam filtering (e.g. Cleanfeed)
- Ignoring cancels/supersedes
- Banning users
- De-peering
- Usenet Death Penalty

• Don't feed the trolls?



- Don't feed the trolls?
- Only works on people who care about being part of the community



Ignoring abuse doesn't work


- Many trolls will escalate, or go after other targets
- Community members give up and leave
- New users get discouraged even more quickly

Ignoring abuse doesn't work

- Spammers don't give up either
- New users see wall-to-wall garbage

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If you're running a social media site, you don't owe anyone a platform.

Server admins must be proactive in fighting abuse

- Have a usage policy
- Enforce it consistently and swiftly

Server admins must be proactive in fighting abuse

- Have a usage policy
- Enforce it consistently and swiftly
- Persistent abuse kills communities
- Reputation is hard to recover once lost

Problems scale up as your user base does

• Large providers need an abuse team

Be prepared for legal issues

- Copyright
- Child protection
- GDPR

Be prepared for misuse from the start

- Usenet was designed in a high-trust environment
- How could a bad actor use a feature for spam or harassment?
- Don't assume that users, or even admins, will be trustworthy

Federation is a viable model

- Usenet has existed for over 40 years
- A highly relevant online social space for ~20 of those years
- A long and thriving future ahead for decentralized social media
